# 1 Remember how to use the PHP + SQL server you installed

## 1.1 Using WAMP (Windows Apache MySQL PHP)

- Put a PHP file you want to test into C:/wamp64/www/: download http://www.barsamian .am/2022-2023/S7ICTB/TP6\_Exo1.txt and rename to .php, or use any other script.
- Make sure wampserver is running and has opened a local PHP server.
- Open your browser and type http://localhost/TP6\_Exo1.php (or your script name).

# 1.2 Using MAMP (Mac Apache MySQL PHP)

- Put any PHP file you want to test into /Applications/MAMP/htdocs/: download http: //www.barsamian.am/2022-2023/S7ICTB/TP6\_Exo1.txt and rename to .php, or use any other script.
- Make sure MAMP is running and has opened a local PHP server.
- Open your browser and type http://localhost/TP6\_Exo1.php (or your script name).

# 2 Exercises

Let's have a look at the "Inches to Centimeters Converter" from last week, see Listing 1. This webpage is not interesting: it is not dynamic! It only prints the diagonal length of a 14-inches screen, in centimeters. Let us at least be able to choose the size of the screen (in inches)!

This week, we'll see two ways of doing this.

### Exercise 1

Computer:  $\checkmark$ 

The PHP script in Listing 2 reads your screen size from the url that you use to open it. Download the script from http://www.barsamian.am/2022-2023/S7ICTB/TP7\_Get.txt, rename it to .php and run it with http://localhost/TP7\_Get.php?size=15<sup>1</sup>. Or run directly http://www.barsamian.am/2022-2023/S7ICTB/TP7\_Get.php from my website, and add ?size=15 at the end. Modify the size value that you "pass" to the script.

### Exercise 2

Computer: 🗸

Another solution is to create a first page that asks the size value (through a form) and to catch this value with PHP code. This can be done thanks to the GET method, as before, but having everything in the url is not always a good idea. To avoid using the url, there is the POST method. The PHP script in Listing 3 asks for a screen size and the one in Listing 4 catches this value to do exactly the same thing as before.

Download scripts from http://www.barsamian.am/2022-2023/S7ICTB/TP7\_Form.html and http://www.barsamian.am/2022-2023/S7ICTB/TP7\_Post.txt (rename the second one to .php), then run them by typing the url http://localhost/TP7\_Form.html. Or run http://www.barsamian.am/2022-2023/S7ICTB/TP7\_Form.html directly from my website. Modify the size value that you "pass" to the script. Notice that the first page is pure HTML, we just need PHP to manipulate the value from the form, not to send it thanks to the form.

### Exercise 3

The goal of this exercise is to create a webpage that asks the user for a number (through a form with POST method), and a second webpage, that takes this number and checks whether the number that was given is an even or an odd number (and prints a message telling whether the number — that has to be printed — is an odd or an even number).

<u>Remark 1:</u> When a form contains a text input, it is not mandatory to add a "Submit" button. Pressing enter inside this input will submit the form anyway.

<u>Remark 2:</u> In fact, it is possible to pass the values to the same webpage, but it requires a more convoluted code, so we won't get into these details.

### Exercise 4

### Computer: $\checkmark$

You are in charge of organizing the wedding of your best friend. Here's the thing: a lot of people that your friend invited cannot see each other, and you have to make the best table plan. Ever.

Here are the rules for a happy wedding, given that each table can accommodate for at most 8 persons:

- Table 1 is for kids (age < 14)
- Table 2 is for the elders (age > 80)
- Table 3–6 are for everybody else (26 more people, and for some mysterious reason, each of those 26 people have a first name that begins with a different letter! How convenient to automate the process, you'll agree with me!), with the following sub-rules:
  - $\diamond$  A... hates B....
  - $\diamond$  C... and D... would like to chat together.
  - $\diamond~ {\rm E...}$  wants a table with less persons.
  - $\diamond$  F... and G... want table 9. Wait... what?
  - $\diamond$  R... hates Z....
  - $\diamond\,$  Oh, and by the way, your friend likes tables with a prime number of people on it. Just so you know.

Create a webpage that asks the user for a first name, an age (through a form with GET or POST method), and a second webpage, that takes this name and this age and outputs the table number where this person should be seated.
